Footprints in the Ozarks

In early 2012, Ozarks writer Ellen Gray Massey wrote and asked if I would be interested in reading and reviewing her memoir, *Footprints in the Ozarks*.

It took less than a minute to reply, "Of course!"

At the time, I'd known Ellen for about 15 years, and for as long as I knew her, she was an inspiration to me and other writers. She was kind and generous and wise, as well as a talented writer and storyteller and a respected authority on the Ozarks.

After explaining my workload, I wrote that most likely I couldn't finish my review until May of 2012. She graciously answered that would be no problem and promptly sent me a signed copy of her memoir.

Here's my review of Ellen's delightful memoir:

Footprints in the Ozarks is a collection of short essays that capture the essence of the Ozarks, its people, its traditions, and its impact on American culture. Ellen's Ozarks story opens in December, 1944, with a story about her future husband Lane Massey. Dedicated to the memory of Lane, Footprints in the Ozarks is a personal glimpse into Ellen's years as a wife, mother, teacher, writer, and Home Agent for the Missouri Farm Bureau.

The memoir is divided in three parts: Home Agent in Lebanon, The Farm, and Back in Lebanon. The book's primary setting is Laclede County, Missouri, around the town of Lebanon, Missouri, located along historic Route 66, now Interstate 44. As you read about Ellen's life, you'll learn about Ozarkians, Ozarks customs and sayings, and a rural lifestyle in bygone days—a time of Shivarees, homemade rag rugs, pie suppers, and one-room schoolhouses. The photos enhance the memoir and give an intimate portrait Ellen and of her family.

While Ellen Gray Massey's footprints mark her life's work, her memoir *Footprints in the Ozarks* will leave an indelible impression on readers who want to learn about the people and the place—the mysterious, magnificent, Missouri Ozarks.

Many people – and things – inspire me.

Inspiration has shaped me, fueled my passion to succeed, and two teachers were instrumental to me chasing my dream of becoming an author: Helen Breedlove and Ellen Gray Massey. My sophomore year, Mrs. Breedlove fostered my long-time

dream of being a writer. Mrs. Massey inspired me to be an author by living her own dream. Women, I learned from watching her, could do anything a man could do. In an era when men controlled journalism, Ellen Gray Massey was a pioneer. She helmed Bittersweet in a time when women were the secretaries, not the editors. And being inspired by her was my honor and my privilege. I read her books and marveled. I studied the craft from books she recommended, starting with Stephen King's On Writing. She valued the experts, understood the craft, and never stopped teaching and learning. But she not only advised me, she was a role model that I will continually try to emulate. She spoke about it; she taught it; she modeled it; she lived it. Until the day she died, she was still writing.

She once told me the only way to be a writer was to write every day, no matter what I was writing. And she continued to inspire me for many years, as we went from being teacher and student to writing colleagues and friends.

Ellen inspired me with her work ethic. She motivated me with her passion. She humbled me with her friendship and her compliments. Very few honors compare to when Ellen emailed me and told me she was honored to have her YA book nominated for awards alongside *Dregs*, my novel that placed second for the Walter Williams Major Work Award to her book. Standing next to her, no longer just teacher and student, but fellow authors, has been a highlight in my career. While getting our picture taken, she admitted that she was proudest of me for getting my PhD, one of the few things she regretted not doing in her career. To have her say she was proud of me was monumental. And her next words will stay with me throughout my career and my life. "Never stop learning...whatever you do, never stop learning."

She didn't just preach it, she practiced it.

I've been inspired by sunsets, patriotism, individuality. But no one has inspired me for more of my life, next to my mother, than Ellen Massey. Her words inspired me. Her life inspired me. She inspired me. And I will strive to be the author, the teacher, and the person she modeled. Making her proud still matters.











Ozark Legend: Ellen Gray Massey

The Ozarks has lost a legend. The world has lost a beautiful soul. Many who knew her have lost a true friend. Her children have lost their mother. Ellen Gray Massey left us during the early morning hours of July 13, 2014. A heart that beat passionately for almost ninety-three years has been silenced, but she leaves a behind a legacy that will never be equaled in these parts.

No one was more devoted to the promotion of the Ozarks than Ellen. Nothing made her madder than to see her beloved hills portrayed in a negative fashion. She spent many years writing books and articles about the Ozarks. She was determined to make everyone see the same beauty she saw in this part of the country. She was a passionate teacher right up until the end. Her enthusiasm and spark never waned for a moment.

She retired from teaching in 1986, but then moved on to becoming a multipublished author with a wall full of awards. Her last award was one she prized above all others, the Western Writers of America Spur Award. Unfortunately, she never got to hold that award in her hands but knowing that she had won it made her so very happy. Among her other recent achievements, she was also inducted onto the Wall of Honor at the Cowan Civic Center in Lebanon and a plaque hangs on the wall among the other distinguished honorees.

After retiring from teaching, and in addition to writing, she co-founded an organization called Ozark Adventures (now Ozarks Heritage Foundation) located in Branson, a group dedicated to preserving and promoting the Ozarks. Through that group she started teaching Elderhostels and continued to do so until just last year.

Most people in the Lebanon area will forever remember her for her contribution to Ozarks' history through the Bittersweet program at Lebanon High School from 1973-1983. She helped to preserve the past through having students interview people who knew the "old ways." They even created a quarterly magazine called *Bittersweet*. Ellen always said the students did all the work putting the magazine together, she was just there for guidance.

Ellen helped many people throughout her life. Her greatest desire was to see others be successful while she stayed in the background. She was so proud of her former students and spoke of that pride often. Even after being retired almost thirty years, she couldn't go out without running into someone that she taught. Many of Lebanon's most successful and influential people were her students. Ask any of them and they will all agree that she was a great influence in their lives.



Ellen was a great believer in simplicity. One of her favorite sayings was, "Use it up, wear it out, make it do or do without." She lived by that philosophy every day. She didn't want her life to be overwhelmed with clutter, and when she felt like that might be happening she would give things away. She was generous to a fault but it made her happy to give others joy. In fact, her entire collection of Bittersweet memorabilia – interviews, pictures, drawings, audio tapes - was donated to the Lebanon-Laclede County Library a few years ago. It's there for anyone who wishes to see it. Again, her way of sharing her vast collection as a way of promoting the Ozarks.

Ellen's light shone brightly for a very long time, but as with all good things, it had to end eventually. Anytime would have been too soon for those closest to her, but she lived so passionately and actively that I can't imagine anyone saying she didn't live her life to the fullest. Everyone who knew her will forever be changed for the better. The books she wrote will be around forever for future generations to read and learn

about this very special lady and how she loved her Ozarks.

Rest in peace, my dear friend. A piece of my heart will always hold your cherished memory.

Remembering Ellen Gray Massey.....

There are many writers in and about southern Missouri but in July, we lost one of the greats. Ellen Gray Massey was a very fine writer, an excellent teacher and a generous mentor and source of encouragement on all aspects of writing.

While a glance across the room might reveal a slightly built gray-haired woman somewhere between the ages of 50 and 100, like a book, judging her by her cover was a grievous error. She taught for decades in the public school system, editing *Bittersweet* Magazine, 40 issues worth over 10 years, a student written-produced magazine modeled after *Foxfire*. She also taught many writing classes, workshops, and Elderhostels for adults, and once retired from full time teaching wrote and/or edited 29 books, both fiction and non-fiction.

Most of all, she was a gentle soul and a dear friend, devoted to all things Ozark. She lived past her 92nd birthday, remaining perfectly sane and of sound mind and mostly, sound body to the very end. She is already greatly missed by those of us who loved her and were fortunate enough to be blessed by her friendship as well as her sound yet non-threatening editorial skills. And even those who never knew her except as a name on a page, will miss her blessed depictions of her beloved Ozarks.

Greetings, Fellow MWG Members,

Although it's taken me a while to get in the groove of everything, I'm happy to report I think I've got a handle on things now—thanks to Deborah Schott and Harold Ream,

who did an amazing job setting up the database and getting everything well organized!

With that, I've included the MWG bank balance as of August 5, 2014, which is \$16, 587.55. You'll also note that I transferred \$1,000 from our PayPal account into the bank account. This

leaves a balance of \$308.93 in our PayPal account. We leave a small balance in this account, just in case we have to refund any monies received.

Also, I'm happy to share the 2014 Conference FINAL Income and Expenses spreadsheet. As you can see, we came out in the black with this conference, which is fantastic. Everything is fairly self-explanatory; however, if any member has questions about the report, please feel free to contact me at treasurer@missouri writersguild.org.

I also want to share a

decision the board voted on when we met after the 2014 conference in April. In order to garner additional funds/ income for MWG, the board unanimously agreed that I should search out a means to invest a small portion of our money into a safe, incomeproducing account. Currently, I am looking into CD rates and Money Market accounts to invest \$1,000. Although these type of accounts do not pay a high rate of return, at present they
